Hi Friends —

My **August Artist of the Month** is my late friend, **Benny Powell**, best known for his twelve-year tenure (1951-63) with Count Basie's orchestra and his elegant eight-bar contribution to the Count's immortal 1955 recording of "April in Paris." His solos with the Basie band displayed a fluid technique, easy swing, and blues-laced, story-telling approach to improvisation, establishing him as one of the finest modern jazz trombonists. A versatile and accomplished musician, after leaving Basie Benny worked on Broadway, films, television, and recordings, and his trombone graced the bands of Duke Pearson, Thad Jones and Mel Lewis, Randy Weston, Benny Carter, Gerald Wilson, and Jimmy Heath, among many others.

Although an unsuccessful kidney transplant in 1990 required him to undergo thrice weekly dialysis treatments, Benny never let it hold him back. He kept up a rigorous playing, teaching, and touring schedule, taking his treatments wherever he happened to be in the world, making every gig, and always maintaining the high standard of performance that he demanded of himself, and of others.

I'll never forget a phone call I got from him in January 1996. I hadn't heard from Benny in a bit, but it was the holiday season and I figured that he might be away visiting family. "Hello, Bob. It's Benny Powell." "Hey Benny, what's up? How've you been." "OK, I just got a new kidney," he said, making it sound like, "I just got a new suit," which, knowing Benny as I did, is something he might very likely have called to tell me. ([He was a very sharp dresser.](#)) This time the transplant was successful and afterwards Benny was more active than ever.

It's impossible to count how many musicians I've spoken or corresponded with, both before and since Benny's passing in June of 2010, who have remarked on his gentlemanliness, generosity, and grace, not to mention his intelligence and humor. Of course he was a great musical talent. But Benny Powell's greatest talent was as a human being, and **without Benny Powell this poor world is a little — make that a lot — poorer.**

NEW & RECOMMENDED CDS

Pete McGuinness: Voice Like a Horn (Summit): This well-titled CD spotlights another side of the gifted trombonist Pete McGuinness. Walking in the steps of trombonist-singers like Jack Teagarden and Frank Rosolino, and recalling the distinctive vocal timbres of Chet Baker and Mel Tormé, McGuinness truly does use his voice — well, just as the title says. And he blows some typically fine trombone on a couple of tracks, as well.

Arturo O'Farrill & the Chico O'Farrill Afro Cuban Jazz Orchestra: Final Night at Birdland (Zoho): Nearly every Sunday night, for thirteen and a half years, Arturo O'Farrill and his brilliant band graced New York's Birdland, celebrating the legacy of one of the most important music makers of the last century, his father, Chico O'Farrill. This CD documents the band's triumphant last appearance with some of Chico's masterworks, plus a new piece by Arturo featuring a third generation of O'Farrill's, his sons, Adam on trumpet and Zachery on drums.

Jerry Tilitz: Jerry Tilitz Meets Joe Gallardo (TCB): This meeting of trombonists, American expatriates, and German residents, Jerry Tilitz and Joe Gallardo, is a pure delight. Their spirited playing perfectly complements each other, Tilitz's original compositions and his arrangements of standards ("Yardbird Suite," "Love for Sale," "I May be Wrong") are fresh and inventive, and his vocal on "Do It the Hard Way," an overlooked Rodgers and Hart tune, is most appealing.

Michael Treni: Pop-Culture Blues (Bell Production Company): The blues can take a wide range of forms and offer infinite possibilities for personal and collective expression. Trombonist-composer-arranger Michael Treni has conceived this original ten-part suite for big band that traces the role the blues has played in the evolution of jazz. Strong solos reinforce Treni's rich writing, as each movement pays tribute to a major jazz composer or leader.
