Hi Friends —

"A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

Americans, you do not possess an absolute and unfettered "Second Amendment right" to own a gun. Nothing in those twenty-seven words above grants you that dubious "right." *Nothing.*

Only in recent years did the Supreme Court endorse the (mistaken) notion that the framers of the Constitution wrote the Second Amendment in order to protect a private right of armed self-defense. In *United States v. Cruikshank* (1876), the Supreme Court ruled, "The right to bear arms is not granted by the Constitution; neither is it in any manner dependent upon that instrument for its existence," and limited the applicability of the Second Amendment to the federal government. In *United States v. Miller* (1939), the Court ruled that the federal government and the states could limit any weapon types not having a "reasonable relationship to the preservation or efficiency of a well-regulated militia." **That's called "gun control."**

So what is this whole "militia" thing about? Article 1, Section 8 of the Constitution specifies that the role of a militia is to "execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections" — including subduing the Natives and capturing runaway slaves — "and repel Invasions." At that time the US did not have a federal standing army, so state militias were necessary for these purposes. They no longer are. And "personal self-defense" was *never* the role of these militias.

"Ebola?" If you want to talk about an "epidemic," consider this: In the United States today you have an infinitely better chance of dying from a gun shot than from Ebola — especially if you're a school kid. And what "virus" caused this epidemic? A gross misinterpretation of the Second Amendment by a small cadre of reactionary judges.

NEW & RECOMMENDED CDS

Matt Brewer: Mythology (Criss Cross Jazz): Bassist Matt Brewer's debut CD as a leader is a thoughtful, thought-provoking presentation of original compositions, plus Ornette Coleman's "Free." While there is much fine solo work throughout — particularly Brewer's extended statement on "Abiquiú" — this is a richly textured program of "group music" filled with spontaneous interplay among the members of this intuitive sextet.

Michael Dease: Relentless (Posi-Tone): Michael Dease is the most creative and exciting trombonist of his generation, and here he takes his art to the next level with this skillfully arranged, solidly swinging big band session. The sections are filled and the solos are handled by an impressive array of (mostly) young jazz talent. Historically the big band format has played a vital role in the evolution of jazz. Recordings like this keep that tradition alive and thriving.

Hal Galper: O's Time (Origin): This latest release by the pianist Hal Galper's trio (with bassist Jeff Johnson and drummer John Bishop) weds his fascinating theory of "Rhythm Pyramids" — members simultaneously playing different subdivisions of time and tempo — with their innovative "Rubato Style" to create some astoundingly bold, collectively improvised music. The concept may seem "high," but the performances are engaging and remarkably accessible.

Bob Stewart: Connections — Mind the Gap: (Sunnyside): This ambitious new release by tuba master Bob Stewart showcases him in two different, yet complimentary, musical contexts. With his longstanding First Line Band (Curtis Stewart, violin; Jerome Harris, guitar, Matt Wilson, drums, plus guests) he puts his own stamp on classic tunes by renowned jazz composers and respected colleagues. Joined by the PUBLIQuartet he premieres the five-part suite for tuba and strings, "In Color," a brilliant new commission from young composer Jessie Montgomery.

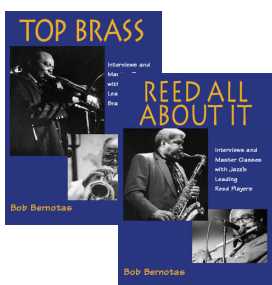
